

UNCG's Maximizing Access to Research Careers Undergraduate Student Training in Academic Research (MARC U-STAR) Fellowship program offers talented students underrepresented in the biomedical sciences an opportunity to prepare for graduate school.

UNCG's MARC U-STAR Fellows work in research labs during their junior and senior year and receive:

- A yearly stipend and tuition is paid at the in-state level
 Undergraduate Research Experiences
- Funding to engage in year-round research projects
 - Paid summer research experiences
 - In a UNCG faculty mentor's lab
 - With a research group at another institution
 Specialized courses and workshops
 - Travel funds to attend scientific conferences
 - Opportunities to publish and present their work

Conference for Minority Students (ABRCMS) from November 10-13, 2021. ABRCMS is one of the largest communities of underrepresented minorities in STEM. Students attend this conference to present their research, enhance professional development skills, explore graduate schools, and network. During the conference, attendees from over 350 colleges and universities participate in poster and oral presentations in twelve STEM disciplines.

The STAMPS (Science, Technology and Math Preparation Scholarships) Program is supported by the National Science Foundation and it offers scholarships for academically talented undergraduate students in the sciences. The primary goal of the STAMPS program at UNCG is to provide financial and community support for undergraduate students who are majoring in Biology, Chemistry, Computer Science, Geography, Mathematical Sciences, and Physics and Astronomy. Students are awarded scholarships based on a demonstration of both a significant promise for success in science/math and a measurable financial need. In addition to financial support STAMPS incorporates a variety of community-building measures including peer mentors, a science colloquium series, tutoring, field trips to research facilities, and undergraduate research opportunities

URSCO Faculty Fellows 2021-2022

The goal of the URSCO Faculty Fellows program is to identify, support, and disseminate new ideas and pedagogical practices that increase the accessibility of Undergraduate Research on our campus.

This year, three UNCG faculty members, **Dr. Michiel Van Veldhuizen**, **Ms. Sam Harlow**, and **Ms. Joan Sutton** will serve as URSCO Faculty Fellows along with **Dr. Joanne Murphy**, Classical Studies, who is serving as Senior Fellow. The Faculty Fellows will work alongside URSCO Director, Dr. Lee Phillips, to develop and refine additional strategies for *integrating research in the curriculum*.

The Faculty Fellows program, which has been running since AY 2017-2018, has supported 15 UNCG faculty members as they redesigned their classes and organized training and information workshops open to all faculty. Faculty from across the University have participated as Fellows or attended our workshops that we hold each semester. Represented departments include Art, Communication Studies, Anthropology, Classical Studies, English, History, Media Studies, Kinesiology, Geography, Community and Therapeutic Research, Biology, and the University Libraries. The URSCO Faculty Fellows program was key in providing a model for the redesigning for 42 classes in the Humanities in 13 subject areas through *Transforming the Humanities* that was funded by the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation (2018-2019). Over 800 students participated in these classes.

This year the Faculty Fellows program is dedicated to supporting the new *Minerva Academic Curriculum* to assist faculty in redesigning classes that enroll a high number of non-majors.

• Dr. Michiel Van Veldhuizen, Classical Studies

- Van Veldhuizen will redesign CCI 205 Classical Mythology, which carries a MAC marker in Global Engagement and Intercultural Learning. He will incorporate a Course based Undergraduate Research Experience into the class by scaffolding research assignments focused on a related theme throughout the semester that will culminate in a final project.
- Joan Sutton, Community and Therapeutic Recreation Samantha Harlow, University Libraries
 - Sutton and Harlow will redesign Community and Therapeutic Recreation (CTR) 101: Leisure and American Lifestyles that is taught asynchronously and online. They will create a Course based Undergraduate Research Experience that focuses on MAC Health and Wellness competencies.

Required of all:

- Minimum of two semesters (or at least 8 weeks in a summer research program) engaged in mentored research/creative inquiry
- Endorsement of Research/Creative Inquiry Mentor and/or Department
- Presentation at UNCG's Thomas Undergraduate Research and Creativity Expo
- Engagement in at least two URSCO sponsored or co-sponsored student workshops
- Completion of survey of your research experience

at least 2 of the following:

- Presenting Author at (1 or more from this list counts as 1 of the 2):
 - State of North Carolina Undergraduate Research and Creativity Symposium (SNCURCS)
 - SoCon Undergraduate Research Forum (SURF)
 - Posters on the Hill (Washington, DC)
 - National Conference for Undergraduate Research (NCUR)
- Presenting Author at a disciplinary conference
- Receive and Complete an URSCO Undergraduate Research and Creativity Award (URCA)
- Thomas Undergraduate Research and Creativity Expo award winner and/or recognition of excellent research/creativity as an undergraduate within your department/program
- Receive a regional or national research/creative inquiry-focused award
- Senior Honors Project
- Author (or co-author) a peer reviewed publication (or in review with mentor verification)
- Author/compose (or co-author) a Musical or Theatrical Production
- Work juried into an off-campus group art exhibition
- Curated or organized a group or solo exhibition--on campus or off-campus
