

The symposium serves as a platform for students to present their research and creative projects, spanning a wide range of disciplines.





The 2023 edition of SNCURCS was hosted by Wingate University and South Piedmont Community College on November 11. The event featured a diverse range of presentations, discussions, and interactive sessions, allowing participants to learn about and share cutting-edge research and creative endeavors. In total, there were 401 presenters from 31 institutions who contributed to the success of the symposium, further enriching the collaborative and interdisciplinary atmosphere of the event.
